Hung jury

David Clayson, the disgraced councillor for Govan and Ibrox, has hanged himself in his home. This follows a period of months where he was constantly in the newspapers as his trial for corruption, fraud and tax evasion was first seemingly unwinnable, only for evidence to be thrown out by the court, and Clayson to be released on bail just a week before his suicide.

Police revealed that Clayson was found in his study, with the door locked from the inside. He had left a suicide note, in which he apologised for his conduct and for the shame it had brought his family, claiming that this was the only way he could allow them to make a new start.

Police forced their way into the locked room early on the afternoon of the 28th of May, after Mrs Clayson became increasingly distressed at her husband's lack of reply to her calls to him through the door. The police medical examiner pronounced Clayson dead at the scene.

Sources close to Clayson reported that although the publicity following his arrest and trial had affected him deeply, he had been

showing signs of putting this behind him and planning means of resurrecting his political career. This therefore came as a shock, and Clayson's recent good mood is suspected to have covered a deeper depression which had gripped him. Clayson's death may just spare Glasgow's procurator fiscal from the embarrassment of having the highest profile trial for years collapse around his ears.

The police hunt for the Hobo with a Petrol Bomb ran into difficulties this month, as dozens of individuals across the city embarked in copycat incidents, inspired by the masked tattered avenger.

Each incident has involved single people drawing attention to themselves, before inflicting serious harm upon their would-be attackers. Some have achieved this by having friends

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with baseball bats waiting around a corner, others by setting their assailants alight.

A number of the vigilantes have been arrested, but the similarity of their tactics has caused police difficulties in establishing if they have apprehended the culprit of the original attacks. This has not been helped by the individuals who often lay claim to being the Hobo. Some commentators have claimed that this hardly matters – the message has taken root among the ordinary people of this city.

The message is simple, and can be summarised in a quote from the 1976 film “Network”: “I’m mad as hell, and I’m not going to take this anymore!” Certainly it seems that ordinary citizens have taken it upon themselves to fight back against the rising tide of fear and oppression which has been opposed upon them.

The entire situation has already caught fire numerous times across Glasgow, quite literally in many places. Now it remains to be seen if that fire will catch and spread, if the cleansing fire can be maintained or will be stamped out, and if there is anything left of the city after it has run its course.

Dear Dark Times staff writers,

Please consider my response to your article “The Dark Times needs you!” where last month, you requested help from a citizen of Glasgow, of which I have considered myself to be for a few years. If this piece is accepted for entry in your newspaper, this would be my first article for the Dark Times, a step I take hesitantly I must add.

In the spirit of your request, I should like to think that I can aid you as I have aided other Camarilla members in the past. However, if I'm honest, I am not normally quite so benevolent to strangers, particularly malicious ones who wish to spread propaganda in a planned attempt to disrupt, divide and decimate my home and community.

However, what did inspire me to write this piece was a line I couldn't help but notice you chose to include.

After all, I used the same line in my introduction to my poem “Slugs” last October in this very paper, a line that was first coined by an esteemed member of my clan, a line that alluded that you may be willing to accept help from a domain you have spent the last 3 years besmirching. After all, it was you, who allowed your opinions to come before your integrity; be it in the uninformed assumptions behind who was responsible for Glasgow-O and its downfall (*Dark Times March 2011*); the baseless speculation that somehow the richest clans may have caused that Icelandic volcano to erupt (*Dark Times May 2010*); the taking of sides on which Prince would be most suitable for Glasgow whilst not being known, accepted residents in the domain (*throughout numerous Dark Times back issues*); and the incredible assertion that of all kindred, the Malkavian Justicar, I repeat, Justicar, was acting against the will of the Camarilla of all things! In light of this, your reasoning behind a request for information from Glasgow at all is questionable. After reading your commentary for 3 years now, it is my firm belief that you, the Dark times staff writers, do not 'need' anyone within the Glasgow domain considering how you treated members of this court so caustically in the past with your axe-to-grind approach to journalism. No, I would assert that if the Dark Times needs anything at all, it needs to start helping itself.

The Dark Times *needs* to become more objective like a broadsheet rather than subjective like a tabloid. An opinion is for the reader to form, not the writer. I believe you would do well to leave the opinions to the readership and kindred members who write for the paper rather than falling into the traps you were guilty of in the past by attributing your biased stories to the nameless, faceless “Dark Times staff writers”.

What the Dark Times *needs* is more dignitaries who are willing to give their opinion rather than hearing

from the same voice from London all the time. Meanwhile, in the exciting city I reside in, we have no primary source giving their opinions because you set the Dark Times against the Prince of the domain – meaning that any Glaswegian writer who wishes to grace your paper would be easily accused of speaking out against their protector just by admitting to writing for your paper.

More to the point, I'd love to hear more from the likes of Mr Edward Williams, Mr Farr and Lady Eleanour Plunkett and the other relevant specialists across the UK. After all, London is not the only talking point, as events past and present have shown.

The Dark times *needs* accountability, whether it's from you as the unnamed "Dark Times staff writers" giving personality to be judged, or guest writers who do not cower behind pseudonyms like "The Voice in the Night" and other anonymous submissions so that we, the readership, know that the kindred who present their views are proud of what they say, for better or for worse. You may think me critical of Margery Houndsworth-Stone from the above paragraph but I should like to applaud her for being a reliable and brave voice, unfaltering throughout a fog of shifty, anonymous columnists. Last month, you wrote that you pay your writers, though I can't help but feel that you owe something more rudimentary than currency to your readership. No, as a readers, we require a good newspaper - a solid newspaper, one without trite accusations and false libel presented as fact, we require an accountable newspaper with a variety of columnists who are not afraid to be named so that their esteem may be judged within our society. We require a plurality of opinion from a society unafraid to share their opinions.

If you do choose to print this letter, I ask only that you seriously consider my feedback as one of your readership in the hope that you accept your past errors of judgement for a more objective, inclusive newspaper.

It is often a personal view that at times is not trying to be objective, but rather the individual opinion of the writer in question. It may sometimes even be factually incorrect as we simply have not got the resources to confirm every piece of information submitted, nor is that something we are trying to do. What we do try and do is look at the goings on within the city of Glasgow, and report of those that might be of interest to our readers. We want to provide a means to get anyone's opinion distributed and discussed around the Elysia of Glasgow and in our own way to give the freedom promised by the Elysia, a safe haven for discussion and negotiation, to the kindred of Glasgow. Just like you will need to

weigh how much stock you place in a rumour heard at one such Elysium you also need to weigh how much stock you place in anything you read in our publication.

I would wager that as someone who has read our publication over the last three years you will most likely find at least a couple of things that have interested you, maybe to the point that you either got involved in the situation or based decisions on the information you obtained from us. In the end if you have come to the conclusion your existence would be improved by not reading it, then don't read it. If you believe that the problem is that our paper is good but not good enough, then use your voice and make it a better paper. Police cover up the Ripper

The rise of vigilante violence has provided Strathclyde Police with sufficient smoke to obscure and cover up a new serial killer in Glasgow. The victims of the killer are female prostitutes from the most depraved areas of greater Glasgow. Each victims' throat was cut prior to further abdominal mutilations. Of the four murders so far committed there has been a removal of internal organs from two of the victims leading to proposals that their killer possesses
