CCTV CAMERAS ESSENTIAL IN SOLVING MURDER

Some people see them as a necessary evil, while others see them as just the next step on the way to a "Big Brother State." However, the CCTV evidence presented in the Eddie McVitie murder provided crucial evidence to the police that led to the eventual capture and conviction of John McNulty. The footage that caught McNulty running from the scene with the weapon in hand was taken from one of the many cameras operated by security firm Glasgow O.

Since the introduction of CCTV cameras in the early 1990s' a recent study conducted by Glasgow and Edinburgh Universities, clearly shows the major impact that the cameras have in helping to stop and solve many crimes. The main report shows that while statistically

crime has risen over the last ten years by as much as 20 – 25 percent, the rate of solved crime, involving the use of CCTV cameras has risen to between 38 and 47%. So in real terms according to the study the introduction of CCTV cameras throughout the city of Glasgow has significantly reduced the number of unsolved crimes.



The main reason for this rise in solved crimes are the state of the art digital cameras used by Glasgow O – the images are perfectly crystal clear – yet another benefit of the digital age. **GLASGOW VAMPIRE LIVE ACTION
 ROLE - PLAYING**

THREE FIREFIGHTERS INJURED IN BLAZE IN GLASGOW TOWER BLOCK

THREE firefighters were taken to hospital suffering from burns and heat exhaustion after tackling a fire in a block of flats this morning.

Their condition is not known.

Around 60 firefighters were called to the fire in Glasgow's Whiteinch area at around 3.30am.

An investigation is under way into the cause of the fire.

It broke out on the 11th floor of a block of flats on Curle street.

Two women were rescued in the early stages of the blaze, which was flamed by high winds, Strathclyde Fire and Rescue said.

A statement said: "Due to the severity of the fire and the extremely hot and dangerous conditions being suffered by the crews, three firefighters subsequently required medical attention after suffering burns and heat exhaustion.

"Two firefighters remain in hospital."

The two females were also taken to hospital.
